#### **Faculty/ Staff Mentor Program**

In Fall 2016, our pilot semester 2.0, we focused on collaboration, coordination and integration with other Project Succeed projects. We recruited mentees from the Block Scheduled Courses: Mexican American Studies 10A and Communication Studies 20. We also met with the Theme Community Residence Hall Advisors. This presentation yielded an invitation to conduct an orientation with 60 student residents at the beginning of the spring semester.

An exciting development is our new office space in Peer Connections. Our mentor intern, Janelly Ruiz, is attending Peer Mentor Staff meetings, holding office hours and available to coach students on developing their profiles and selecting a mentor.




#### **Block Scheduling**

Fall 2016 was the second year we block scheduled all new freshmen in the College of Business, College of Engineering, and Child and Adolescent Development Department. For Fall 2016, freshmen from the Department of Music were added. These students were assigned schedules that included at least two shared classes with other students in their declared majors.

For Fall 2016 we block scheduled only 2 classes, preregistered students for those classes, and increased proactive communication with instructors regarding block scheduling, and peer mentors.

#### **Peer Educators & Mentors**

In Fall 2016, we expanded the use of peer educators at SJSU. The targeted classes were lower division classes with either an average failure rate of 20% or more or a higher than the university average percentage of students at-risk for retention (URM, first generation, Pell eligible).

During the Fall 2016 semester, 50 Peer Educators worked with 30 faculty members either as a part of Peer Connections or as a special pilot program through Project Succeed. The Peer Educators were used as follows:12 as tutors, 20 as mentors/hybrid, and 18 as Supplemental Instruction Leaders.

The peer educators took part in professional development opportunities to learn about and develop the skills that may be useful when working as a peer educator. Faculty also met to discuss the best practices of having a peer educator in the classroom and to share with others who were having a common experience. We will continue the efforts of the pilot program and using Peer Connections as a support for other classes in the Spring 2017 semester.

# Student Living Learning Communities

There are six Living Learning Communities (LLCs) located in the first year residential communities. The LLCs are meant to help students deepen their connection to their peers and faculty within a themed community. They are:

Arts Village
BUILD (Business Innovation & Leadership
Development)
CELL (Community for Engineering Living
& Learning)
Black Scholars Community
Rainbow Village
Global Village

Due to the success of block scheduling from Fall 2015, we block scheduled the BUILD and CELL LLCs for a second year and added a third LLC, Arts Village, in the Fall 2016. Students have reported benefiting from being in classes together as they build relationships with their peers.

In Spring 2016, we recruited and hired nine faculty members to serve as Faculty In Residence (FIR) who live in the residence halls and serve as a mentor to residents. The FIR program has strengthened the connection between faculty and students, enhanced the programming quality and breath, and established strong relationships as they interact within the residence halls. The faculty were assigned to each of the four residential areas, with six FIRs linked to each of theLLCs.

### First Year Experience

A meeting with faculty, staff, librarians, and students was held in September 2016. The group brainstormed around student needs and how to address them. Some of the needs discussed were social connections, life skills, and knowledge of campus resources.

The September meeting concluded with participants volunteering to develop and pilot test a range of FYE content delivery mechanisms such as a 3-unit FYE course, a 1-unit FYE course, a Student Housing based FYE program, and an Online/Hybrid Orientation Plus.
