#### **Course Description**

Implementations of advanced tree structures, priority queues, heaps, directed and undirected graphs. Advanced searching and sorting (Radix sort, Heapsort, Mergesort, and Quicksort). Design and analysis of data structures and algorithms. Divide-and-conquer, greedy, and dynamic programming algorithm design techniques.

#### **Course Format**

#### **Technology Intensive, Online Course**

- 1. Online synchronous class. In class each student is required to have an internet-connected device (e.g. smartphone, tablet, laptop computer) to be used exclusively for learning-related activities. In addition a microphone and webcam will be needed if they are not inbuilt in the internet-connected device.

## **Course Requirements and Assignments**
