Section Description

We will continue our inquiry into the cultural myths that shape identity. During fall semester we explored "How we begin" and "Where we grow"; this semester we will focus on "Who we become and breaking the frame."

Specifically we will look at Equality and the Melting Pot, *The Other Wes Moore* (what makes the difference), and Money and Success. The semester will culminate in a Critical Essay where you look back at the various cultural myths from the entire year and decide which one(s) are most powerful in the outcome of the two Wes Moores.

Course Content

The writing assignments you encounter in this course will give you repeated practice in all phases of the writing process: prewriting, organizing, writing, revising, and editing. As you see in the table, the assignments require a minimum of 8000 words, at least 4000 of which are in revised final draft form. The table below explains exactly how the 8000-word minimum will be met and distributed in our course. **The spring essays are in bold type.**

ePortfolio General Information:

Final ePortfolio: At the end of the spring term, you will submit your final portfolio, the culminating exercise of this class. The presentation piece of your portfolio will be the last essay you write, the second self-reflection. The portfolio will also include two sample essays (details to follow) and the documents you have chosen from your writing (over the full 30 weeks of instruction): prewriting, drafts, and revisions.

A Note on Your Workload in This Course: This semester will be much more difficult in that the reading load and essay assignments will be challenging – I must prepare you for English 2/1B or other A3 class of your choice. Please keep up and take advantage of my office hours when you are struggling.

A Note on Participation: This semester I expect more participation from you! Some of you are very comfortable with this already and others not so much – we will work on this. There will be times when your writing/thinking is private and other times when your voice needs to be heard. We will be engaging in numerous class discussions; during these activities your participation is valued and required. Other participation requirements will be: writing group activities/presentations, discussion question reviews, in class writing/sharing.

Writing Group Participation and Presentations: Since English 1B/2 is a highly verbal and communicative class with much lateral learning, you will be held accountable for your work as a group – not only in daily activities but also in formal/small group presentations.

A Note on Attendance: <u>Please come to class on time and ready to work</u>. Entering class after it has started is not acceptable and I ask that you respect that. If you have a situation that keeps you from coming to class please email me. If you reach five absences/late to class I will respectfully talk to you about it.

Grading Information:

While the formal writing assignments are the most important component in the course (see list below), there are other categories that will help determine your overall grade. This semester there is a total of 1000 points possible. The point breakdown is as follows:

- Formal Writing Assignments (this includes all drafts/peer review): 850 points
- Journal Writing (5)/Canvas Discussions (3): 50 points (*this may change*)
- Unit Essay Books, Homework/In-Class/Group Work: 100 points
- Participation:100 points. You cannot make up in class work (some exceptions)

NOTE: Your final grade in Stretch English is based on both semesters of work. The spring semester is weighted more than fall; fall will count for 1/3 of your total grade while spring will count for 2/3.

Late Work: Papers are always due at the start of class on the day they are due. All late papers will be penalized ½ grade per day late starting 5 minutes after the start of the class. If you are going to miss class on the day a paper is due I will still expect it to be turned in on Canvas if it is a final draft, or emailed to me if it is an early draft. Turn in a hard copy of the paper when you return to class. ** <u>All drafts must be brought to class as hard copies and submitted to Canvas by the due dates or they are considered late</u>.

Homework is due at the beginning of class. As during last semester, I periodically check your work but only collect it at Eng. 1AS Garrecht-Williams Spring 2018 Page 2 of 3

the end of a unit.

Note: This course must be passed with a C- or better as a CSU graduation requirement (at least 70%) – note that if you have UGRM status, a grade of D- or better clears remediation BUT you will still need to retake the class for the A2 requirement!

*Note: All drafts and peer review activities will count towards the total essay points - you could score high on the final draft and have missed or done poorly on an early draft and that will affect the overall percentage/points on the paper. While the informal writing and homework count for few points compared to the formal writing assignments, they add up and help secure your success in the course.
