ENGL 1A Course Description

ENGL 1A is an introductory writing course that will help you understand the writing process and the goals, dynamics, and genres of written communication. Through interpretation and analysis of texts, you will learn to think clearly and write effectively as you give form and coherence to complex ideas. You will explore writing for various audiences and rhetorical situations.

ENGL 1A Learning Outcomes (GELO)

Upon successful completion of the course, you will be able to

- 1. read actively and rhetorically;
- 2. perform the essential steps in the writing process (prewriting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing) and demonstrate an awareness of said performance;
- 3. articulate an awareness of and write according to the rhetorical features of texts, such as purpose, audience, context, and rhetorical appeals;
- 4. integrate your ideas and those of others by explaining, analyzing, developing, and criticizing ideas effectively in several genres;
- 5. demonstrate college-level language use, clarity, and grammatical proficiency in writing.

ENGL 1A Course Content

<u>Writing:</u> Writing assignments will give you repeated practice in all phases of the writing process: prewriting, organizing, writing, revising, and editing. This class requires a minimum of 8000 words, at least 4000 of which must be in revised final draft form. Writing assignments will correspond to the readings and will increase in

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difficulty as we move through the semester. All assignments must be in MLA format and are due in class. Unstapled papers will not be accepted.

<u>Reading</u>: In addition to being an intensive writing course, ENGL 1A is also a reading course. Reading is a crucial component of the class, as one must read effective writing to become an effective writer. During the semester, you will read a variety of rhetorical and professional works on the art and craft of persuasive language.

Class discussions and activities are based on the reading. It is pertinent that you have the reading completed on the corresponding date on the schedule – I cannot emphasize the importance of this enough. I expect you to read slowly, attentively, and to annotate your text with a pen or pencil.

<u>Rough Drafts & Workshops:</u> Major assignments require rough drafts. Rough drafts must be turned in with your final draft. If you only turn in one draft of an assignment where multiple drafts are due, you will receive an "F" for that assignment.

Workshops are a chance for you to test drive your essay and are very important to the writing process. You must attend! If you miss a peer evaluation workshop, you must still turn in a rough draft with your final draft, and you will forfeit one letter grade on the assignment.

<u>Group work & Homework:</u> During both our in-person and Zoom classes, you will often have group work assignments that you will complete and submit on Canvas. You will also have homework assignments throughout the semester. **Both group work and homework cannot be made-up.**

<u>Participation:</u> Even though our class is held in-person and on Zoom, your participation is still required during both. Your thoughts and questions are important to our communal growth as writers and critical thinkers. The potency of our class depends on your commitment to reading, discussing, and writing with conscientiousness and consistency. Your participation will be assessed through in-class work, group work, and oral participation.

A Note: Logging into Zoom and turning off your video is not considered participation. I need to know that you are there, so please turn on your video when you are in class. Doing so will not only make it much easier for you to learn and stay focused, but it also drastically improves the atmosphere and learning environment of the whole class. If you do not want anyone to see your surroundings (which is perfectly reasonable!), use a Zoom background screen. If you have a genuine reason why you cannot do turn on your video, please talk to me right away so that we can strategize.

Attendance: Regular attendance is crucial to your success in this class. Remember, there are no "excused" absences in college. If you fail to attend a class, you are still expected to turn in the assignments due that day, get details on whatever topics were covered in class, and complete the homework for the next meeting. It is your responsibility to contact me or a classmate to see what you missed.

ENGL 1A Course Requirements and Assignments

SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, you are expected to spend a minimum of forty-five hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on. 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Requirements for particular assignments will vary, but in all cases essay grades will reflect the paper's effectiveness, which is broken down into three major areas: content (this includes maturity and sophistication of thought), organization, and expression.

The following are the criteria by which essays are typically evaluated in first-year writing courses: An "A" range essay is organized and well-developed, demonstrating a clear understanding and fulfillment of the assignment, written in a unique and compelling voice. It will show the student's ability to use language effectively with a solid command of grammar, mechanics, and usage.

A "B" range essay demonstrates competence in the same categories as an "A" essay, but it may show slight weakness in one of these areas. It will respond to the topic suitably and may contain some grammatical, mechanical or usage errors.

A "C" range essay will complete the requirements of the assignment, but it will show weaknesses in fundamentals, such as development. It may show weakness in mastery of grammar, mechanics, usage, or voice. A "D" range essay will neglect to meet all the requirements of the assignment or may be superficial in its treatment of the topic. It may lack development or fail to stay on topic. It may contain grammatical, mechanical, and/or usage errors that interfere with reader comprehension.

An "F" essay does not fulfill the requirements of the assignment.

Classroom Protocol

In this class I expect you to:

- 1. Commit yourself. Academic work is what you make of it.
- 2. Come to class on time. Tardiness is disruptive and disrespectful.
- 3. If you are not using your cell phone for a class activity, it should be silenced and **stowed**, *in the classroom AND on Zoom*.
- 4. Engage yourself in our class. If you are doing anything other than being present in our class work, I will ask you to leave our meeting.
- 5. Take responsibility for your actions, positive and negative. Remember teachers do not "give" grades, you earn them.
- 6. Communicate with me. I am here to help you, but I have no way of knowing if you are unclear about an assignment or otherwise need help unless you tell me. If you have questions about the work, speak up in class, come to see me in my office, or send an email.
