#### **Course Description**

An introduction to the literature of Medieval Europe, mostly written in English, with some attention to French and Latin texts in translation. An understanding of the cultural, linguistic and historical contexts that help us to understand these works. This course can serve as an upper division elective, but many of the texts are also useful for those preparing for the MA Exam Part Two.
