Course Information

Course Theme: What Matters to YOU?

My goal for this this Engl 2 course is that you will learn new skills for explaining your argument to your audience.

The skills you gain here will allow you to not only achieve success in your college writing assignments, but also communicate effectively when talking, texting, what's apping, etc. with friends, peers, coworkers, and family, and more.

As a bonus, you'll get to know other SJSU students, stretch your mind, and have some fun this semester (well, the school kind of fun, that is :).

Course Description and Requisites

English 2 is a course that focuses on the relationship between language and logic in composing arguments. Students learn various methods of effective reasoning and appropriate rhetorical strategies to help them invent, demonstrate, and express arguments clearly, logically, and persuasively.

GE Area(s): A3. Critical Thinking and Writing

Prerequisite(s): Completion of GE Area A2 with a grade of "C-" or better.

Note(s): ENGL 2 is not open to students who successfully completed ENGL 1B.

ENGL 2

This course is open to all students needing to fulfill GE Area A3 (Critical Thinking). It is not open to students who have successfully completed ENGL 1B.

Prerequisite: ENGL 1A or Stretch English (with a grade of C- or better)

Course Content

<u>Diversity:</u> SJSU studies include an emphasis on diversity. You will engage in integrated reading, Writing, and oral assignments to construct your own arguments on complex issues (such as diversity and ethnicity, class and social equality) that generate meaningful public debate. Readings for the course will include writers of different ethnicities, genders, and socio-economic classes.

<u>Writing:</u> You will write a series of essays informed by research and articulating fully developed arguments about complex issues. Assignments emphasize those skills and activities in writing and

thinking that produce the persuasive argument and the critical essay, each of which demands analysis, interpretation, and evaluation. Writing assignments give you repeated practice in prewriting, organizing, writing, revising, and editing. This class requires a minimum of 6000 words, at least 4000 of which must be in revised final draft form.

<u>Logic:</u> You will learn methods of argument analysis, both rhetorical and logical, that will allow you to identify logical structures (such as warrants, evidence, qualification, rebuttal; enthymemes and syllogisms) and distinguish common logical fallacies.

<u>Reading</u>: In addition to being writing intensive, ENGL 2 is also a reading course. You will read a variety of critical and argumentative texts to help develop your skills for understanding the logical structure of argumentative writing.

<u>Oral:</u> You will be presenting your arguments orally to class both as an individual and as part of a group.

Time Commitment

Success in ENGL 2 is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

Final Examination or Evaluation

In ENGL 2, our learning culminates in a digital Reflection and Portfolio Assignment. In this assignment, we will gather samples of our writing that demonstrate our learning; we will write a reflection essay that explains what we have learned, how we learned it, and how we will use it in future learning; and we will submit our portfolio for consideration to other people in the first-year writing program. This is our chance to identify and articulate what we've learned and what we'll take forward with us into future learning/writing experiences.

Participation

In class participation: Engl 2 is an in-person course and regular participation is essential to succeed. Attendance will be noted each day, and points will be assigned for the work we do in each class period. Participation is worth about 20% of your final grade for this course. Engl 2 is an interactive class and in class work cannot be made up at home. Students who have specific conflicts that prevent attending class should email the teacher to discuss how to catch up.

Policy for Late Work

In class assignments, including journal posts, cannot be made up without explicit permission from the instructor. Do not try to submit work for days that you missed class and assume that I won't notice you were absent.

Reader Responses and major assignments (including outlines and rough drafts) will lose 10% if handed in late but within a week of the original deadline. Assignments will not be accepted more than a week late without permission from the instructor.

Note: Life happens and we all need help sometimes meeting our deadlines. I'm willing to be flexible, but only if you let me know ahead of time. I don't want to hear the day after an assignment is due that you need an extension. It is my experience that letting work drag out leads to continued missed deadlines and increases the odds of a student not passing. Come talk to me if you are overwhelmed so we can figure out a plan to get you back on track.

Policy about Al

My goal is that you engage with the exciting challenge of figuring out what *you* want to say in writing by doing the work yourself with academic integrity. All cannot do your thinking for you, so it has limited use in this course. You will write your own personal ethical manifesto about All at the start of the semester and be required to reflect and report on any All use when submitting final drafts of your major assignments.

We will learn to use AI as a tool, but do not be tempted to use AI to *write* your essays in Engl 2. If I notice unauthorized use of AI in an assignment, I will require the student to meet with me individually or assign a zero grade.

Diversity and Class Discussions

SJSU is a wonderfully diverse learning environment, and this course is designed to build on the strength of our different backgrounds. However, our readings and class discussions may raise sensitive and challenging questions, and in preparation we will create norms for how to deal with

potential conflict or inappropriate comments during the first week of the semester. I hope we will try to interact with each other from a place of mutual respect and learning, which require both an open mind and an open heart. Although I doubt it will come to this, any behavior that threatens the learning environment and the safety of the classroom will not be tolerated.

Course Goals

As per the <u>SJSU Course Course Catalog</u>, English 2 focuses on the relationship between language and logic in composing arguments. Students will learn various methods of effective reasoning and appropriate rhetorical strategies to help them invent, demonstrate, and express arguments clearly, logically, and persuasively.

Prerequisites: ENGL 1A, 1A-F/S (with a grade of C- or better)

Satisfies GE Area A3: Critical Thinking and Writing

Course Overview and Key Information

Our academic focus is: Identifying, analyzing, and forming arguments so you can explain, defend and persuade others about the issues that matter to you.

Want to convince your friend to choose Chipotle over In and Out?...Defend your favorite musician against people who lob negative comments?...Persuade someone to vote in this year's Presidential Election? To argue any of these perspectives effectively, you must identify your audience, frame an effective argument using evidence to back up your ideas, and choose the right context or platform in which to communicate. These are skills you will learn and practice in Engl 2.

Composing Text and Digital Arguments: In 2024, platforms for argument are often visual (meme, social media, YouTube, infographic), so you will practice analyzing visual arguments and presenting your argument in a visual format. But text is far from dead, so you will also practice writing essays and short answers.

Reading: You will read both alphabetic and visual text in Engl 2 every week and in almost every class.

Research: You will learn how to frame a research topic, search for sources, evaluate sources, read source material to gain insight on your ideas, and synthesize that research to support your argument.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)

GE Area A3: Critical Thinking and Writing

Area A3 courses develop students' understanding of the relationship of language to logic. By engaging students in complex issues requiring critical thinking and effective argumentation, A3 courses develop students' abilities to research and analyze important topics and to construct their own arguments on issues that generate meaningful public debate and deliberation. Courses include explicit instruction and practice in inductive and deductive reasoning as well as identification of formal and informal fallacies of language and thought. Completion of Area A2 (Written Communication I) with a minimum grade of C- is a prerequisite for enrollment in Area A3. Completion of Area A3 with a grade of C- or better is a CSU graduation requirement.

GE Area A3 Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of an Area A3 course, students should be able to:

- 1. locate, interpret, evaluate, and synthesize evidence in a comprehensive way, including through library research; and integrate research findings into oral and written arguments through appropriate citation and quotation;
- 2. use a range of rhetorical and logical strategies to articulate and explain their positions on complex issues in dialogue with other points of view;
- 3. identify and critically evaluate the assumptions in and the contexts of arguments; and
- 4. use inductive and deductive logic to construct valid, evidence-supported arguments and draw valid conclusions.

Writing Practice: Students will write a minimum of 6000 words, at least 4000 of which must be in revised final draft form.

Course Materials

Required Texts:

- The required text for Engl 2 Sect 5 is <u>Everything's an Argument</u>. Please purchase or rent this book from
 the SJSU Bookstore, or you can find used editions online. You absolutely must have this book to
 succeed in Engl 2 this semester. There will be in class reading responses to check that students are
 keeping up with course reading assignments.
- We will also use articles, podcasts, videos, and other texts that will be posted on Canvas.

Course Requirements and Assignments

This Engl 2 Course has three major assignments and a final portfolio project, along with other short assignments, journal writing, and reading responses throughout the semester.

The three major assignments are:

- 1. Visual text analysis (final product is an essay or digital composition)
- 2. Poem or Song text analysis (final product is an essay)
- 3. Visual argument composition (this is a group project; final product is a digital composition)

Plus, the culminating assignment required for all SJSU Engl 2 students: Final Portfolio (essay)

I will create a set of complete directions for each assignment, which will be posted on Canvas and discussed in class. Assignments will include reading, formal and informal writing, and, in some cases, research. Throughout both reading and writing, we will use multiple modes of communication (oral, written, digital, and visual).

My goal for Engl 2 is that every student will succeed and pass the course. If you come to class and do the work, you can get at least the C- grade required to earn credit for Engl 2. If you are struggling, I am here to help you!

Success in Engl 2 requires five simple things:

- 1) Do the reading and homework
- 2) Come to class and participate (see below for more details)
- 3) Engage in the writing process by drafting, revising and re-writing each major assignment
- 4) Participate actively in group projects
- 4) Complete work on time
- 5) Get in touch with me if you fall behind or need help!

Classroom Participation

In class work and participation is worth about 20% of your final grade in Engl 2. As such, it is the easiest part of your grade to control and I hope you will come to class consistently all semester. However, life happens: If you have extenuating circumstances that prevent you from coming to class (illness, family emergency, etc.), please let me know as soon as possible. (See F15-12, University Policy, Attendance and Participation for more information about SJSU policy on attendance). If you choose not to come to class and do not contact me to explain why you are absent, it will negatively impact your grade.

Grading Information

Grade Scale

Your final grade in the course will be recorded as a letter grade, ranging from A to F. I will use + and – grades to refine the evaluation within the letter-grade categories. The cumulative grade that displays on Canvas may not reflect the grade that you will get in Engl 2, as there is some discretion for class participation and attendance.

Please note: As a GE course, students must receive a C- or higher in Engl 2 to get the Area A2 GE credit toward their degree. Students who do not earn at least a C- in English 2 must retake it. As a result, it is my highest goal that every student who comes to class regularly and submits their work will pass this Engl 2 course. If you are falling behind and worried about failing, don't ghost me! Instead, reach out and let's find a path forward towards successful completion.

Grade Criteria

Requirements for each assignment will vary, but in all cases, grades will reflect the assignment's effectiveness, which is broken down into three major areas: content (this includes maturity and sophistication of thought), organization, and expression. Please see the rubrics for specific grading criteria for each assignment.

Extra credit

There are six assigned Reading Responses throughout the semester. Students can choose to do up to two additional Reading Responses from the bonus list on Canvas to gain extra points. Any extra Reading Responses are due by the date of the final exam: December 13 at noon.
