

- Housing shortages have been exacerbated.
- State recognizes the role of the CSU in addressing student needs for mental health services.

- is the nation's largest four-year public university, with 23 campuses and eight offcampus centers.
- educates the most ethnically, economically and academically diverse student body in the nation.
- is renowned for the quality of its teaching and preparing job-ready graduates.
- educates approximately 486,000 students.
- employs nearly 56,000 faculty and staff.
- stretches 800 miles from Humboldt in the north to San Diego in the south.
- has conferred degrees on more than 3.9 million living alumni.



What Happened

- \$92M problem last year
 - Essentially a 20% budget challenge
 - Academic Affairs absorbed 3-1/2% of that challenge
- \$168M HEERF funding
 - Defined qualified expenditures only
 - Time based (fully expensed by March 2022)
- Various Perceptions of "Surpluses"
 - "State investment"
 - "Massive reserves"
 - State was generous, but fell significantly short of our needs
- A "Dip" not a "Canyon", thankfully






Operating Fund Expenditures by Division 2021-2022 Budget

SJSU Expenditure Budgets 2021-2022 Budget





Students can access the Spartan Food Pantry for perishable and non-perishable goods in the Student Union and receive assistance applying for CalFresh, a monthly food assistance program.




MENTAL HEALTH







Alquist Site Surrounded by New Office / Job Producing Spaces


