Every CSU employee is a mandated reporter for child abuse and neglect and also has a duty to report potential violations of Title IX. Situations involving harm, abuse or misconduct may also be reported to law enforcement or medical services, where and when applicable.

What is Title IX?

- Title IX is a federal statute that protects everyone at institutions of higher education from discrimination, harassment, violence and other forms of misconduct.

Reporting a Title IX Incident

The Title IX and Equal Opportunity Office at SJSU encourages survivors of sexual assault, rape, dating/domestic violence, and stalking (collectively sexual misconduct) to get connected with free, confidential and secure supportive services on campus through professional staff.

- SJSU's Confidential Survivor Advocate provides individual and group sessions for survivors of sexual violence, intimate partner violence, stalking & harassment.

 reported to local enforcement.
